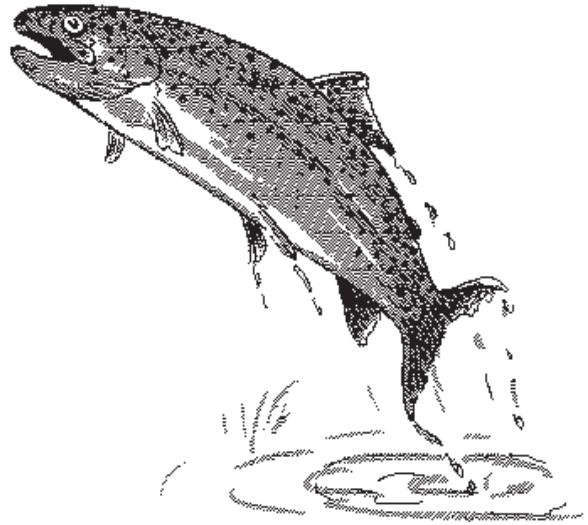

We had a great meeting last month. Lara Usinowicz stopped by to talk about a product she represents that I feel is very important. The product is called Restop 1 & 2 Disposable Travel Toilet. If you were not at the meeting, there were some chuckles because 1 & 2 is just that, relieving yourself when you do not have access to an outhouse. Her products can easily be carried in a fishing vest or backpack. It solves the obvious problem with a convenient and non-odorous way of disposing waste. The board is going to look into having these products on hand at the general meeting. Lara said she would give us a discount.

Our own Karen Christopherson was our speaker for the evening. Her presentation was on "Trout on Colorado State Land". It was very informative. She has this presentation on an E-Book (Book on a Computer CD) that she and Al Marlow produced. I decided to purchase all her E-Books. To say the least, I am not disappointed. There is a wealth of information on each E-Book (State Lands, the Colorado River, the North Platte River, the Flat Tops, and the Fifty Colorado Tailwaters). I hope this year we can talk Karen into guiding a group of us on Clear Creek. I was told she is the consummate expert.

The DVD on the O'Fallon restoration project is finalized. We were able to view it after Karen's presentation. We will make copies available for just the cost of the DVD.

Randy Huiting has set up some more quality programs for us, starting with the next general meeting. Chris Wells, guide with Blue Quill, will be our program, with his presentation "Fishing the Colorado and Williams Fork Rivers in Middle Park". In May, Charlie Meyers with the Denver Post will be presenting "New Trout, New Destinations (Colorado)". In June, Rick Saez, Sales Manager with Umpqua will present "Umpqua - the Move to Denver and Their Latest Products". It is rumored that he comes to a meeting with a bunch of goodies. So be there or you may miss out.

ETU and the Mt. Evans Outdoor Lab agreed to stock Jackson's Pond to provide a better experience for the 6th Graders when our volunteers help them with fly tying. Last year when the kids went to Jackson's pond to try their creations, there were few trout to be caught. It was decided that the pond needed stocking. The Outdoor Lab put up \$150 toward the stocking. It was then up to ETU to pony up and help stock the pond. At first, I received a pledge from one of our board members. I promised I would not identify him, but this was in the e-mail he sent to me. **"I will personally contribute \$100. I think this is really important for the kids' fly tying activity. As an alumnus of OELS, I know the positive impact the school had on me. Unfortunately, fly tying wasn't available in those days."** This is really what being a member of ETU is all about. During the last general meeting, I talked about the fish stocking and about the generous donation. Ford Oliphant spoke up and said, "Why don't we take up a collection?" Before you knew it, we collected another \$230. Sincere thanks go to Tim Steckert, Ford Oliphant, Ron Belak, Ken Wilbert, Ross Seline, John Haile, Paul Regan, Tom Lockwood, Dick Wheeler, Tim Haller, and Rich Reynolds for their generous donations. The stocking bill was \$500 + transportation fee of \$85. With donations and the Mt. Evans part, ETU was only out \$100. Sandy Stevens, Principal, said that a strict Catch and Release policy would be enforced. If you would like to volunteer to help with the Mt. Evans Outdoor Lab Fly Tying and Fishing, get in touch with Len Wheaton. He can always use good help. As an added perk, you can fish Jackson's Pond before and after meeting with the 6th Graders. Len told me that the pond was stocked with over 200 fish some 14 - 15 inches long.

Our next items of business concerned using some of ETU's funds to put up some bilingual fishing regulation signs along Bear Creek. We are going to purchase 25 signs.

days are upon us. We negotiated with the Rec. District for three free days a month. Here is how it works, you can utilize the first Friday and the third Friday, or you can utilize the first Friday and the Saturday of the third weekend containing both a Friday and a Saturday. You cannot utilize both days of the third weekend containing both a Friday and a Saturday. This does not mean you cannot fish the consecutive days. It means you will only be allowed one of the days as free. Clear as mud? Let me muddy the water further. On the occasion like this month, the second Friday is the 14th, and the third Saturday is the 15th. It was decided the free days had to be a consecutive Friday and Saturday. John Haile said it the best. The free days are the first Friday of the month and Friday and Saturday of the third weekend containing both a Friday and Saturday. Hence, This month's free days will be the 7th and the 21st/22nd. The volunteer list will be is at the Rec. Center's front desk. You will have to either show your TU membership card or your driver's license. If you are not on the list, do not expect a free day.

I was told the ponds are fishing well. Remember: catch & release, flies only, barbless hooks, and a landing net. Be a good steward: don't litter and pick up any litter around the ponds. If we can keep the ponds pristine, we will be invited back. The Buchanan Recreational District Second Annual Fishing Camp date is set for June 10, 2006. We need volunteers. Call Len Wheaton, John Ellis, or me if you would like to help with this event.

Fly Tying For Fun

I confess. I tie small flies....and I fish them too. So should you!

As we all know, midges can make up a large part of a trout's diet. Especially during the 'off season'. You can fish these tiny flies 'in the film', or dead drifted. (Hint: Keep your tippet on the long side and use almost no weight.) And yes, you're going to have to dig that spool of 7X out of the bottom of your wader bag. That said, here is one of my favorite midge patterns.

Polar Midge

Hook: Tiemco 2488, size 24 - 32

Thread body: 6/0 Danville or equivalent - black and red are my favorites, but I tie 'em with nearly every color I have

Rib: x-small silver (or gold) wire

Wing: 2 polar bear body hairs

The key to tying these little guys is to make every turn of thread count. There's no place to hide anything, including un-necessary wraps.

Start the thread at the eye, take 4 turns (snug!) down the shank and trim the tag end. Next tie in the wire, leaving the tag end long, with 2 or 3 loose turns. Then gently pull the wire back (under your loose wraps) until the tag end is ~ one eye dia behind the eye - then cinch the thread lightly and wrap back over the wire to just beyond the barb, and back again to the end of the wire. Keep your wraps close together on both passes. Wrap the wire rib forward and tie it off on the underside of the shank with 2 turns only, but do not trim yet, just move the wire out of your way. Tie in 2 polar bear body hairs parallel to and on top of the shank — leaving about half an inch protruding beyond the eye - again, 2 turns only (snug!). Now go ahead and trim the wire. Fold the forward ends of the hairs back over the body and take 2 more turns over the fold (again, snug!) to hold the wings back. Whip finish over the folded wing 'butts', just enough to cover them. Trim the wings to slightly less than body length. I like to cement the heads lightly, because there is so little holding them together. Use thinned cement, so it just soaks into the thread.

If you've done the body right, you will have a small step at the forward end where the wire is tied off. The wing should tuck nicely into the area between there and the eye, and should lay back at a slight angle above the body. If you build up too much bulk at the forward end of the body, the wings may want to stick straight up. I doubt that the fish would care too much, but the fisherman might. It depends on who you're tying for...

This is a modification of a pattern I got from a friend who, as I recall, got it from "...some old guy in 'The Canyon' who was catching fish right and left with it. I believe he called it a B-52." The only difference is that the B-52 has a pearl crystal flash wing. I was going to include a photo, but I couldn't get close enough.
